At Howard University's **Center for Women, Gender & Global Leadership** we focus on gender issues that women of color are facing in the U.S. and the African diaspora.



We are an interdisciplinary program with the goal to be a **Center of Excellence** for Black women and Black feminist consciousness, activism, and global leadership.



We promote **transformational leadership**, global engagement, research, service learning, and building impactful partnerships.



Dear Friends and Partners.

The year 2022 has been a roller coaster as the world continues to navigate through the fluidity introduced by the Covid-19 pandemic. In the United States, we experienced a momentous victory in the appointment of Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson as the first Black woman on the Supreme Court of the United States.

We also witnessed the rolling back on women's reproductive rights through the Dobbs case that upended Roe v. Wade and set back years of activism for women's rights. The global pandemic has led to growing international awareness of the care economy and the gendered face of care work—especially the critical role women of color play in this cycle of labor production. These few examples of the rollback on women's rights strongly signal that advocacy and activism for women's rights is a constant struggle.

At the Center for Women, Gender, and Global Leadership (CWGGL), we have followed these national and global developments through our programming and public engagement, as captured in this report. As an interdisciplinary center of excellence, we bridge the divides between all disciplines through our research and programming by bringing different speakers into conversation with each other.

As a Center dedicated to academic excellence and research, we increased our research output through our first faculty summer research grant. We supported graduate students through the summer student research grants. We are also building a repository of oral history narratives through the launch of the first phase of the Women in Leadership at Howard University oral narrative project.

A major highlight for this second part of this year was celebrating our first anniversary and launching our first annual Global Leadership of Women (GLOW) Summit. A summit that brings Black women in leadership into conversation on topics of importance to Black women in the US and the African Diaspora.

The CWGGL continues to grow, and this year we expanded our team from one to three full-time staff. As we draw the curtain on this year, I am grateful to all my staff, colleagues, student workers and volunteers, and the university administration for their support of the CWGGL. We could not have achieved all we have without the support of the faculty and staff at Howard University, who share their time, talent, and skills in meeting our vision and mission.

Next year will bring us more gains as we sharpen our focus for year two. I encourage all our old partners to keep supporting us and invite new partners to join us in pushing forward the agenda for gender equality. Thank you for supporting us. In the ancestral wisdom of the people of Africa. "I am because we are."


IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS

We joined **Howard University's Student Association | HUSA** for their annual **Open House,** where we engaged with students across disciplines.

Immediately after the open house, social media platforms saw an increase in followers and engagement across platforms, with Instagram seeing more than a **450% increase** in our overall reach.









We welcomed Grinnell College professor Tamara Beauboeuf-Lafontant to the Center, where she discussed her latest book, To Live More Abundantly: Black Collegiate Women, Howard University and the Audacity of Dean Lucy Diggs-Slowe.

Throughout this lecture, professor Beauboeuf-Lafontant highlighted how the founding member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Inc.'s philosophy of 'living more abundantly' envisioned educational access and institutionalized thriving for Black women across Howard's campus.

WOC INCUBATOR PITCH COMPETITION

We hosted the **Women of Color (WOC) Incubator Pitch Competition** alongside the **Women's Business Enterprise National Council (WBENC)**, where 20 Howard University female students across disciplines had the opportunity to compete for capital - **up to \$5,000** - to support their businesses.

This incubator provides the next generation of **Black women entrepreneurs** with the **resources**, **community**, and **support** they need to strengthen their business idea and grow their early-stage ventures. The program culminated with a pitch competition awarding the 1st place winner with \$5,000, 2nd place with \$3,000, and 3rd place with \$1,000.

| FACULTY ROUNDTABLE

We hosted our first faculty roundtable for grantees to present their research focused on centering **Women's Experiences, Voices, Perspectives,** and **Bodies**.





We hosted the first **Race and Gender Equity Consortium (C-RAGE) Retreat** with The Policy Academies, the African-American Policy Fund, and the National Birth Equity Collaborative.

The purpose of C-RAGE is to create a strong network of women of color researchers and:

- Advance women and girls of color research agendas.
- Provide training, education, and advocacy in intersectional research, institutional design, policy, and advocacy.
- Promote praxis rooted in data, evidence-based practices, and W/GoC lived experience.
- Focus on investing where inequity has done the most harm to W/GoC and where they have the most potential for power and influence.



The center hosted our first **Mothers of the Mecca** informational meeting, which allowed students to learn more about **M.O.M.**, a research initiative and student-led organization designed to support parents on campus. As recipients of the **Faculty Summer Research Grant**, this project aims to better understand the experiences and needs of student parents at Howard University.









DOMESTIC AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE AWARENESS



In collaboration with the Center for African Studies, we discussed **Domestic and Sexual Violence Awareness and Prevention in the African Immigrant Community.**

Dr. Anjerrika Bean, the Center's Assistant Director, and **Lul Mohamud**, MPH, Executive Director of The Person Center, engaged in a robust conversation on the intersections of **violence**, **Black immigrant identities** and **experiences**, and **public health and safety priorities on** both a community and national level.

| CETLA'S LET'S TALK FORUM

In partnership with the Center for Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Assessment (**CETLA**), the Women's Center co-sponsored a forum supporting LGBTQ+ students and allies.

The virtual conversation featured **Mr. Jose Cadiz** -the Founder and Director of the Intercultural Affairs and LGBTQ+ Resource Center, **Dr. Ravi K. Perry**, a professor in the Department of Political Science, and **Dr. Jennifer Williams**, an assistant professor in the Department of English. Cofacilitated by **Dr. Thomas Morris** of CETLA and Dr. Anita Plummer, the discussion covered topics such as resources across campus and the District, critical issues Black and Brown LGBTQ+ people face now, and ways to create a campus culture that cultivates true belonging instead of tolerance.

The center hosted the inaugural Global Leadership of Women Summit with a fireside chat featuring Her Excellency Monica Geingos, the First Lady of the Republic of Namibia, and Professor Kimberlé Crenshaw, Distinguished Professor of Law at Columbia University, and moderated by Dean Danielle Holley, Howard Law School.





In addition to hosting the inaugural summit, students were invited to participate in our first student contest, where they had to answer the question: How I imagine the future of Black women's leadership.

Participants were able to answer the question through art, a written piece, a work of art, or other performances. With more than 100 submissions, winners Kaiia Phillips -- a senior Health Science major from Brooklyn, New York -- and Leyha Williams - a Public Relations major, Sociology and Environmental Studies double minor - delivered spoken word pieces that reflected the times and met or exceeded all of the criteria.

Winners received a certificate, Barnes & Noble gift card, merchandise from the Center, and an exclusive invitation to the VIP room to meet with members of the Women's Centers advisory board, dignitaries, and HU Administration.



Topics ranged from everyday struggles women face across the globe to how social media and western pop culture affect adolescents.

Combining the curriculum surrounding representations of black women in media and culture with Hansen-Quao's advocacy for women's leadership in Africa, created space for an inspiring and illuminating discussion on the intersections.

JULIA GILLARD









Nearly a decade after her infamous speech on misogyny in the workplace during a parliamentary hearing, we welcomed former Prime Minister of Australia **Julia Gillard** for our final Global Dialogue Series speaker of the semester. She discussed her latest book, **Not Now, Not Ever - 10 Years on From the Misogyny Speech,** in a fireside chat with Dr. Dawuni.

Students, alum, and faculty engaged as Ms. Gillard shared her sentiments about the speech and responded to several questions centering on race and feminist policies internationally.

Following the conversation, the former Prime Minister gave **six signed copies** of her book to students in attendance. The book is currently only available in Australia.



| FEMINIST FOREIGN POLICY

Just a few weeks after the **Feminist Development Policy Conference** in Berlin - where Germany committed to a feminist foreign and development policy - the center hosted a group of women from across the globe during a study tour with **The Heinrich Boell Foundation.**

The rich dialogue focused on feminist foreign policy nationally and globally, with HU students sharing their views of feminism and participants of the study tour sharing their understanding of the topic and how they advocate for women's rights and equality in their daily work.
