LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



I have stated as the Executive Director beginning in November 2023, that transitions take time, and they can be challenging. The year 2024 witnessed the Center for Women, Gender and Global Leadership (CWGGL) continue its transition journey. During this transitional phase, the internal structure of the CWGGL was reconfigured. The Program Coordinator position was created, and we welcomed Ms. Imani Hopkins to serve in that role in August 2024. We relied on our work study students and student ambassadors to push our mission in their work with the CWGGL. Drs. Anita Plummer and Amy Quarkume continued in their respective roles as Associate Directors of Faculty Engagement and Student and Community Engagement.

Our personnel capacity was one of our biggest challenges in 2024. Despite this challenge, we were able to remain visible both on and off campus. We sponsored and co-sponsored superb events with well-known and respected guests from the international community, the scholarly community, and Howard University. Some of them include fireside chats with Drs. Patricia Hill Collins and Patricia McFadden, Ms. Erica Williams, and Ms. Yassine Fall, lectures by Drs. Pearl K. Ford Dowe, Ana Lucia Mosquera-Rosada, Menah Pratt Clarke, and Howard's own Professor Kimberly Jones. We recruited students to participate in the Women's Business Enterprise National Council (WBENC) sponsored by the Marriott Corporation.

I am appreciative of the opportunities that allowed me to bring attention to issues that affect many women across the globe such as gender-based violence. I discussed and examined gender-based violence in a global perspective at the International Conference for Medicolegal Death Investigation and Integration of Gender-based Violence and Equity. The conference was sponsored by the School of Medicine, Department of Pathology at Howard University. My participation at the GenNext Annual Symposium focused on the need to strive for a more inclusive workforce in the fast-spaced and ever-changing humanitarian aid sector.

It was my pleasure to participate in three student events: the AfroSoul Symposium: Embracing our Shared Narratives Across the African Diaspora sponsored by the graduate students in the Department of African Studies, Freshman Seminar sponsored by the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Summer Leadership Institute sponsored by the Department of African Studies.

The mission and vision of the CWGGL were also highlighted in my participation at the NextGen Symposium for its fellows, a podcast sponsored by Howard University's Center for HBCU, Research, Leadership, and Policy, and an interview with Voice of America following the 2024 presidential election. I even served as one of the judges at the Pitch Competition that is part of WBENC.

I am grateful to our staff, students, and co-sponsors for their commitment and dedication to the vision and work of the CWGGL. We look forward to continuing our partnerships in 2025 and we invite others to join us on this journey to showcase and strengthen Black women's leadership at Howard University, the community, nation, and world.


Join us in ending Women's History Month with words of empowerment, an exchange of ideas about femininity, womanhood, and self-love on our campus!

to discuss the unique institutional experiences Black women encounter in higher education.




